However, there was hope, as various volunteer organizations had managed to prove over the last six years that a cure was possible for many felines.

We found great guidance and assistance from "Help for FIP" https://www.lunasfiplegacy.com, which is dedicated to education and awareness to cure FIP. They are supported by a network of volunteers who provide day to day guidance and access to the medications required to treat the disease. They have a Facebook page offering program updates, connections to others treating their pets for emotional support, and other news and developments.

From the Humane Society website: As of Jan. 1, 2024, <u>California's Proposition 12</u>, widely considered the world's strongest law for the protection of farm animals, now enjoys full implementation. The law is a win against the practice of extreme confinement of farmed animals, requiring that mother pigs, hens used for eggs and calves raised for veal in California be given at least enough space to stand up, turn around and extend their limbs. The law also bans the in-state sale of pork, eggs and veal produced via extreme confinement.

A CAT FAMILY TALE – TRAPPING **OUTDOOR FELINES**

This past fall, I was contacted to trap backyard cats and a litter of kittens. The small colony had been fed for months starting with one black cat. The goal was to provide foster homes, vetting, socializing, and to place these kitties in loving homes to live out their new lives as indoor pets. Over two weeks, a total of ten felines were removed from the yard - two adult cats and eight kittens of various ages, colors, and temperaments. At the time of this writing, some of these kittens have been adopted and some still need to be placed into permanent homes.







It's been lots of work fostering most of these animals in our home and making many trips to the Peabody vet hospital. We appreciate FOBA's monetary support and the visitors that have come to play with some of these foster kitties. However with "kitten season" around the corner, more foster homes are needed! WHAT IF I FIND A STRAY CAT? SOME TIPS FROM FOBA

If you are concerned about local cats that may not have a home, you can see if the cat is injured or consistently hanging around. Hang posters in the neighborhood, ask the neighbors if it is their cat or if they know who it belongs to. You can make a paper collar for the cat and write "call me" and your phone number on the collar. FOBA tries to exhaust all options to find owners, and to leave owned cats with their owners.
